Mr. LEO HEALEY TOWNSEND, a self-admitted former member of the CP, between 1943 and 1948, advised during his testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities on September 18, 1951, at Los Angeles, California, that HOWARD DA SILVA was an important member of the Hollywood Section of the Los Angeles CP in the 1940's.

PAJL R. MILTON, member of the Radio Writers Guild, in testimony before the Senate Sub-Committee on Subversive Infiltration of Radio, Television and Entertainers Industry, stated on June 7, 1951, that ARNOLD PEARL always associated with the pro-Communist group of the Radio Writers Guild and had a long and public front record including teaching at the Jefferson School of Social Science, New York City.

- "1. 'For years, the Communists have put forth the greatest efforts to capture the entire American Labor Party throughout New York State. They succeeded in capturing the Manhattan and Brocklyn sections of the American Labor Party but outside of New York City they have been unable to win control.' (Special Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 1311 on the CIO Political Action Committee, March 29, 1944, p. 78.)
- "2. 'Communist dissimulation extends into the field of political parties forming political front organizations such as the * * * American Labor Party. The Communists are thus enabled to present their candidates for elective office under other than a straight Communist label.'

 (Internal Security Subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Handbook for Americans, S. Doc. 117, April 23, 1956, p. 91.)"

On October 7, 1956, Peter Hawley, New York State Chairman, American Labor Party, publicly announced the American Labor Party State Committee unanimously approved a resolution dissolving the organization and ordering the liquidation of its assets.






