

c story has all the law ma-ls for irony-edged social the-Shaw wrote one version adrs ago, but its theme will be modern as long as overcrowded cities stand. And it's being acted out now in the harsh spotlight

of day-to-day drama.
On Broadway the "first play" Success of the season is Lorraine Hansberry's "A Raisin in the Sun," which deals brilliantly with the plight of a Negro family fighting its way out of a Chicago South Side slum.

On Chicago's South Side, one of the principal targets of the city's fight against slum landlord's is the Hansberry family.

For an other year, the city has been pressing the Hans-

berry Enterprises—run h the playwright's two brothers and a sister—for correction of scores of building, health and fire viola-tions on 13 tenements they own.

Listed as Owner

The case took on a bizarre public note two weeks ago when, in a new action, the city listed the playwright as owner of one of the buildings.

The published reports created a painful personal conflict for Miss Hansberry. On the one hand, it would have been simple enough to announce she owned no South Side property and drew no profits from slums. On the other hand, she did not want to make a gesture that would suggest she was disassociating here. gest she was disassociating hel

self from her family.

Curled up in a chair in her small, third-floor Bleecke St. apartment in the Village the ether day. Miss Hansberry said:

"When I first heard about the story, I didn't know what they were talking about. I called Chicago and learned that my name had been placed on a piece of property when it was purof property when it was purchased some years ago. I wasn't told about it and I have no legal or equitable title to that building.

A Sense of Responsibility

"Of all the things in the world I could have been hit with, this was the most painful. I had visions of adding a few thousand to the anks of the cynics. Some sophis cates treated it as body's business but mine."

As a writer with a trenchant sense of social responsibility, Miss Hansberry doesn't relish the lofty detachment implicit in that reaction.

"It' not something to be dis-missed as 'my business,'" she said. "I'm not a slum landlord. I've never derived a cent from that building-whoever owns it. Parenthetically, I might say I haven't drawn a cent from the family since I came east nine years ago."

Two weeks later, Carl pleaded guilty to the volations after a compromise conference with Municipal Judge Kowalski. The judge said he would not press for immediate payment of the fines. In turn, the \$1,000,000 suit was dropped.

Hansberry was born on May 19, 1930, in Chicago, Illinois, the daughter of a wealthy Chicago family during considerable real estate. She attended the University of Misconsin but did not graduate. She moved to New York City in the early 1950's and has since pursued a writing career. Hansberry has been active since 1949 in writing articles for procommunist publications and making public statements of a procommunist nature. In 1952 she was employed as an instructor at the Frederick Douglas Educational Center in New York City, which school has been described by sources who have furnished reliable information in the past as completely communist controlled and operated. She subsequently was employed on the staff of "Freedom," described by the House Committee on Un-American Activities as a monthly Negro publication in New York City which was controlled by individuals such as Paul Robeson, Sr., and others who had extensive communist front and Communist Party records.

In 1953 she was listed as instructing in the Jefferson School of Social Sciences, which has been cited pursuant to Executive Order 10450. In recent years she has engaged in free-lance writing and is best known for her play. Raisin in the Sun, which was produced on Broadway in 1958 and later made into a motion picture.

In 1953 she married Robert Barron Nemiroff, also known as Bob Rolfe, who at that time was Managing Editor of New Challenge, efficial monthly publication of the Labor Youth League, which erganization has been cited pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

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


In October, 1962, a self-admitted former member of the Communist Party advised that it was overheard at a fundraising party sponsored by Greenwich Village Communist Party clubs in June, 1962, that Hansberry friendly with the "Guardian crowd." This source interpreted this to mean that they associated with the persons publishing the "National Guardian," which has been described by the House Committee on Un-American Activities as a "virtual official propaganda arm of Soviet Russia."

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
