



An article in "The Worker" for January 6, 1952, establish a Frederick Douglass Educational Center in Harlem would be discussed at a conference of trade union and people's leaders on January 12, 1952 at Thoresa Hotel in Harlem.





PRENSA LATINA



Prensa Latina (PL) is a Cuban news agency with headquarters in Havana, Cuba, and branches throughout the world. Prensa Latina, which was organized in Cuba on June 16, 1959, follows in its releases an editorial policy which is anti-United States and pro-Soviet Union.

On April 16, 1962, Prensa Latina filed a statement with the United States Department of Justice conceding that the agency receives the sum of \$125,000 (Cuban) monthly from Radio Difusora Nacional, an agency of or under the supervision of a ministry of the Government of the Republic of Cuba.

On April 18, 1962, Prensa Latina entered a plea of nolo contendere in Federal District Court, Washington, D. C., to a charge of failure to comply with the provisions of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended, and was fined \$2,000.







Dr. Linus Pauling, Nobel laureaute in chemistry, and author James Paldwin are among signers of a statement urging the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith to withdraw its award from the President "unless the Department of Justice drops the scandalous harassment of Mr. Worthy." Worthy, U.S.-born correspondent for the Baltimore Afre-American, was convicted of re-entering the U.S. without a passport after a trip to Havana. He is appealing a threemonth sentence.

The Anti-Defamation League plans to

confer the award on Kennedy at a banquet Jan. 31 at the Sheraton-Park Hotel in Washington. The protest group called for a demonstration outside the hotel at 5:30 p.m. Jan. 31, and simultaneous demononstrations Jan 15 outside ADL and B'nai B'rith offices across the country. In New York, the Harlem Anti-Colonial Committee will demonstrate outside the. ADL office at 515 Madison Ave. between . noon and 2 p.m. Jan. 15.





Frederick Douglass Educational Center Established in Harlem

An article in "The Worker" for January 6, 1952, Section I, Page 8, Column 2, announced that a proposal to establish a Frederick Douglass Educational Center in Harlem would be discussed at a conference of trade union and people's leaders on January 12, 1952 at Therese Hotel in Harlem.

The article said that the call for the conference, signed by W. ALPHEAUS HUNTON and ROSALIE BERRY for a group of twenty eight sponsors, proposed that the new school be launched as a Marxist educational and cultural center based on the needs of the negro, West Indian, and Puerto Rican workers of the Harlem community.






