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

Good Seed Potatoes, especially early varieties, are scarce this year and will be in great demand. We have a fine stock. Most of it has been grown right here on our own land, and our potatoes never were as smooth, clean and free from scab as this year. Our soil is a rich black prairie loam. We do not claim that there is no soil as good for potatoes in the whole world, or that we are the largest growers in the world. It is very easy to make such statements. We do claim, however, that our Seed Potatoes give 'satisfaction. We receive seed every year for our own planting from nearly every section of country, but it is seldom that we get hold of any that does as well for us as our own pure, vigorous, carefully grown stock. In addition to our home grown seed, we have a few carloads of very fine Early Market, Early Ohio and Acme from North Dakota and the RedRiver Valley.

Our Seed Corn and Seed Grains we also grow ourselves, except where noted. We take great pains to have our stock pure and clean, and being grown here in the North its vitality is of the best.

In regard to our Garden Seeds, the Sweet Corn we grow principally ourselves, the Peas and Beans and a few other seeds are grown for us by careful growers. The rest we buy of the best and most reliable seed growers. We take the greatest pains to secure only the best in all cases. Of course all are thoroughly tested.

We do not employ agents to sell our Seeds. We make our prices just as low as possible, and give all our customers the benefit of them by dealing with them directly.

OUR TERMS are cash with each order. Every order will be acknowledged by postal card when received, except in the case of small orders of seeds to go by mail or express, and which are to be sent at once. But if seeds are ordered with potatoes we will ship all together as soon as safe for the potatoes, unless otherwise instructed. We usually begin shipping potatoes to points south of us about March 15. Grain can, of course, be shipped any Please use Order Sheet in making out your order.



VIGOROSA. We introduced this potato last year. We named it "Vigorosa," because its wonderfully vigorous growth was so noticeable. Ponderosa Tomato was so named because of its ponderous size. So we gave this name to this fine new potato because of its extraordinarily vigorous habit of growth. Bear in mind it is an early variety. Not quite as early as Ohio, but about like Hebron. There are plenty of heavy yielding late varieties, but it is not so with early ones. It is a very handsome potato. It has a beautiful flesh-colored skin, with considerable of a netting. It is smooth and

regular in form, and its quality for either baking or boiling, is just perfect, fully equal to World's Fair. Altogether it seems to have no faults whatever, and we believe it will prove a great money maker among early potatoes.

The originator is Mr. D. C. Hicks, the well-known Vermont seed-specialist.

He thus describes it:

"Vizorosa is an inbred seedling of the good old Garnet Chili. It was a very strong, robust grower from the start, and the second year gave me tubers of marketable size and of very good quality. The form of the tuber also was fixed from the first. The plant has a very tough, leathery foliage. Its productiveness, good quality and beauty of tuber will make it a favorite with all planters. I had only one other potato in my collection that gave me a heavier yield and that a late one (Carman No. 3.)"



It resembles New Queen and Beauty of Hebron, only the coloring is more marked. It is oblong in shape, has a fine blush and white mottled skin, with strong eyes, and is a large yielder. It is intermediate in season, about between early and late. One man reports a yield of $127\frac{1}{2}$ bushels from one bushel. Another says:

I consider the Country Gentleman to be the finest potato in existence. It is the largest yielder I have ever seen, and its cooking qualities beat them all. Flesh very white, the tubers cooking up dry and mealy. Season, medium late. You men that want to grow potatoes to exhibit at Fairs will do well to get hold of this. We wish we had more of them. We have never tested a kind which possessed the desirable points of an extra early, large yielding, high quality potato like the Arme."


